Non-degree credentials & the labor market


- What role do non-degree credentials play in meeting workforce needs in your state?

Labor market returns to certificates

- Center for Analysis of Postsecondary Education and Employment (CAPSEE) – Clive Belfield & Thomas Bailey
- Outcomes of certificate earners from 8 states, over 10 years
- Returns to certificate holders 5-9 years after completion
 - Males: \$530/quarter
 - Females \$740/quarter
- However, wide variation across state and certificate type



Strategies for strong non-degree credential programs

- Integrated education and training for low-skill adults
 - Policy approach Creating & funding programs
 - Washington's I-BEST
- Stackable credentials
 - Policy approach State funding for building/incenting stackable credential programs
 - California, Colorado, Oregon, and Utah



Strategies for strong non-degree credential programs

- "Job-driven" financial aid
 - Policy approach State financial aid for short-term programs
 - California (Cal-C Grant)
 - Colorado (CTE Grants)
 - North Dakota (State Grant)
 - Washington (Opportunity Grant)
